

» Become Part of a Great Tradition!

The idea of cross-cultural youth exchange was pioneered by Rotary clubs in Denmark and France in the late 1920s. The program was formally introduced by American Rotary clubs in 1958.

Today, Rotary Youth Exchange serves approximately 9,000 students from nearly 100 countries, building cross-cultural connections that make the world a smaller and better place. Host families are the anchor of the program, opening their homes to provide students with a first-hand experience of life in a new culture.

The North Star Youth Exchange – sponsored by Rotary clubs in Minnesota and Wisconsin – sends dozens of American students abroad and welcomes dozens more students from around the world to the U.S. every year. Local Rotary clubs recruit host families in their communities, with the support of experienced Youth Exchange leaders from the North Star district.



» The Ideal Host Family

A great host family is willing to open hearts and home to an exchange student. Family size and make-up is less important than a sense of generosity and adventure. Although host families often have kids of similar age at home, it's not required. Families with or without kids, empty nesters, and single parents can all make great host families. YOU are the key to a great exchange experience!

» What are the host family's responsibilities?

Exchange students typically rotate among two or three families during the year. That means you'll be hosting a student for about 3-5 months. Your main responsibility is to create a welcoming family environment for your exchange student. You provide room and board, exercise the same parental support and encouragement you would give your own children, and get your student involved in the family's daily routines, chores, and activities.

Youth Exchange is about sharing American culture and family life while learning about the culture and family life of the student you host. You don't need to provide elaborate entertainment. Simply make your exchange student part of your family.

» What are the exchange student's responsibilities?

Rotary requires exchange students to attend school and participate in school activities. They are expected to follow your family's rules and help with household chores as do your own children. Exchange students are not permitted to drive and are required to follow all U.S. laws and regulations.

Rotary International carefully screens students prior to acceptance into the program, and conducts extensive orientation programs to make exchange students aware of rules and regulations. (There is a much longer and more specific set of rules for students than we've outlined here.) Serious problems are rare, but if a situation beyond your capacity or comfort level arises, your local Exchange Officer will be directly involved in finding a solution.



» What support is provided by local Rotary clubs and by the North Star district?

Your local Rotary club supervises the program, helps coordinate with schools and other services, and provides the in-bound student with a monthly stipend. **Host families are not expected to provide spending money.** School lunch fees are paid by the club, and students are covered by their own health insurance.

In addition to direct financial support, your local club provides a support network for the host family and the exchange student, including a student counselor and a Youth Exchange Officer (YEO) able to help with any questions or situations. Club members also provide transportation to required Rotary events.

» How do we become a host family?

- » Expect a standard background check and an in-home interview by a Rotary member.
- » Once approved prepare a place for your exchange student to call home.
